Bishops Score

Before considering labour induction, you can determine your chances of a successful induction by scoring yourself using the Bishops Score table, below. A lower score can mean induction may be more difficult, longer, and will most likely be harder on you and your baby. It is suggested that your score be at least 9 for it to be successful.

Further Bishops Score considerations:

- 1. add 1 point to your score for:
 - 1. Preeclampsia
 - 2. Each prior vaginal birth
- 2. Subtract 1 point from score for:
 - 1. Postdates pregnancy
 - 2. Nulliparity (if this is your first baby)
 - 3. Premature or prolonged rupture of membranes
